

In his speech to the graduating class, Dr. White stressed four characteristics for successful leadership: empathy, task orientation, flexibility/adaptability and passion. He added that, "the global impact of sport is 4.1% of the world economy." White is the first Notre Dame athletic director to report directly to a university president. He is currently an associate professor in the management department of Notre

Introducing the Academy Scholarship for Wounded Warriors

Your donation can make a difference.

On one of my frequent visits to Washington, DC, I was privileged to be invited by the Commander of the Walter Reed Medical Center to visit with the young Americans who have been so severely wounded in their fight against terrorism in Iraq, Afghanistan and other "hot spots" throughout the world. The visit turned out to be the most emotional day of my life.

The Colonel in charge of the Rehabilitation Center provided an overall review of the

therapy that these Americans are receiving. As a former Marine, I had my own stint in a Naval hospital, but I never saw anything like what I witnessed at Walter Reed. There were hundreds of Americans suffering the loss of multiple limbs, yet in virtually every case, these troops made light of their situations and stated that they were going to put their lives back together. This is a mentally and physically traumatic time for these young people, most of whom are in their early twenties.

The Colonel introduced me to a Marine Sergeant who was learning to use two prosthetic legs. Another young Marine was working out on a plinth by rocking back and forth with a medicine ball between the two stumps that were once his legs. He was building abdominal strength in anticipation of receiving artificial legs. He was also missing one of his arms.

The Sergeant was playing with a plastic model of a skull, that bore a large hole on its right side about eight inches long and six inches wide. I noticed this matched the scar on the side of his head. Like the majority of

soldiers injured in the war, he had been taken out by an "Improvised Explosive Device" (IED). After he and his squad were hit, they were evacuated out of Iraq to Germany and on to Walter Reed. He woke up 15 days later missing both of his legs and a significant portion of his skull.

Many of our soldiers are surviving attacks because of advances in military medicine; in prior conflicts they would not have survived. I have never before seen sights such as these at Walter Reed because in the Korean and Vietnam Wars, most of our military never made it off the battlefield.

As I was leaving, the young Marine working out on the plinth took my hand and said, "Once a Marine, always a Marine. Semper Fi!" To be perfectly honest, I could not handle that. It was at that moment I knew the Academy had to do something to help that very special group of Americans.

We know from our own research, and as *Forbes Magazine* has published, the number one career choice of all male high school graduates is to pursue a career in sport. Many of these severely wounded warriors are former athletes who harbor a desire to get back into sport. At Walter Reed, the rehab training details the benefits of sports in their therapy. Like an infant learning to walk, the injured soldiers have to relearn movement. They must train their brain and muscles to use prosthetics.

The Commanding Officer of Walter Reed told me that hundreds of corporations and individuals have come forward to provide money and transportation to take these young warriors to alpine skiing competitions, triathlons and other sporting events.

After discussing this very sad situation with the Academy's Cabinet and Trustees, I have determined that we will help these wounded warriors in the area of sport education by creating an "Academy Scholarship for Wounded Warriors."

This concept is similar to the scholarship program implemented by the Academy for U.S. Olympians who have not completed their degree because they have dropped out of college in the pursuit of making the U.S. Olympic team.

I have had the privilege of coaching or preparing athletes, worldwide, for competition in six different Olympiads. I know the sacrifices that young athletes make. If we can do something for U.S. Olympians, we should also be able to do the same for the "wounded warriors" and the paralympians.

I have personally started this scholarship drive with an initial commitment of \$150,000. The Academy's Trustees have responded by voting to support the drive for this very special group of American heroes. It is my sincere hope that you will also support this very important scholarship drive.

The purpose of the Academy Scholarship for Wounded Warriors Program is to help people in sport education at the bachelor's, master's or doctoral levels. It is not related to other wounded warrior projects. As a 501(c)3 non-profit institution, all donations to the Academy's Scholarship for Wounded Warriors are tax-deductible.

Receiving her award, Moore said, "As alums, we have an opportunity, privilege and responsibility to go forth and serve." For over 10 years, Moore has been involved in ESPN's evolution from a sports media outlet to a sports management and production entity. After ESPN began the X Games, an Olympic-style competition for "action sports" such as skateboarding and BMX, she was hired to manage a staff of 75 that oversaw all

auxiliary events, including the X Trials and B3 events. In 2006, Moore was promoted to her current position. She is also active in the V Foundation for Cancer Research and Women in Cable and Television.

BACHELOR'S STUDENT OF THE YEAR

Brandon Buckley, Pleasanton, California

Brandon Buckley, who earned a Bachelor of Sports Science degree in Sports Management, was the only bachelor's student to graduate Summa Cum Laude (GPA 3.80-4.00).

As the bullpen catcher for the Oakland Athletics, one of the most traveled teams in professional sports, Buckley earned his degree while traveling across the country. He completed most of his coursework online in hotel rooms between midnight and 3 a.m., during road trips with a team that has flown more than 100,000 miles in the past two years, playing 162 games in 180 days (plus spring training). He is currently enrolled in the Academy's master's degree program.

Wesley Davis graduated with honors and earned his Master of Sports Science degree in Sport Management. He is currently the Assistant Men's Soccer Coach at Oberlin College.

Davis has been coaching collegiate soccer for the past five years. He spent three years at Earlham College in Richmond, Indiana, as the Assistant Men's Soccer Coach and Wellness Associate. Yuan Xikun named Sport Artist of the Year 2008 - Sculptor

Chinese sculptor Yuan Xikun has been named the Academy's Sports Artist of the Year 2008 in the sculpture category. The Academy will host an art show to honor Xikun at the Jintai Art Museum in Bejing, China prior to the 2008 Olympic Games on 7 August.

"I am honored to receive this award from the prestigious United States Sports Academy," said Xikun. "This honor will motivate me to continue creating sculptures that unite cultures through sports."

Known as a portrait diplomat, Xikun has depicted more than 200 heads of international organizations, including face-to-face renderings of political and social celebrities such as former United Nation Secretary General Kofi Annan, former U.S. President Bill Clinton, Cuban President Fidel Castro, former South African President Nelson Mandela and International Olympic Committee Honorary Life President Juan Antonio Samaranch.

Following the announcement that China would host the 2008 Olympics, Xikun launched a project titled the 2008 Olympic Landscape Sculpture Designs Contest. The contest in his words would, "make the Olympics more vivid and popularized in

China."


"Mr. Xikun's important contributions have combined art and the Olympics," said Samaranch. "It is significant for sports to promote the development of culture."

Born into a well-known family of traditional Chinese painters, Xikun built the Jintai Art Museum as a venue for political visitors to China. It is a platform for bringing together Western and Chinese cultures. The museum features unique five-pyramidal roofs that symbolize metal, wood, water, fire and earth. "Painting infuses sculpture with new blood and sculpture is a succession of painting," believes Xikun. His sculptures resonate with classicism, romanticism and realism.


In respect to the traditions of China, as host of the 2008 Olympic Games, the Academy is expanding its traditional Sport Artist of the Year award to include a painter, a calligrapher and a sculptor.

So that children in China would understand the contributions of people from other cultures, Xikun designed bronzes of some of the world's greatest scientific and cultural minds including Albert Einstein, Aristotle, Darwin, Louis Pasteur, Ghandi, Abraham Lincoln and Sigmund Freud.

The Academy, home to the American

Yuan has also created over 100 sculptures of leaders from around the world to promote culture in China including Samaranch (r) and Pierre De Coubertin (l) the Founder of the Modern Olympics.

Sport Art Museum and Archives (ASAMA), houses what is believed to be the largest collection of fine sport art in the world. It is dedicated to the collection, display and preservation of sports history, art and literature. Since its inception, ASAMA has recognized the importance of the cultural connectivity of athletic competition and artistic expression.

The Sport Artist of the Year award has been presented by ASAMA for a quarter of a century as part of the Academy's Awards of Sport program, honoring the artist and the athlete. Past recipients include Ernie Barnes, Charles Billich, LeRoy Neiman and Mina Papatheodorou-Valyraki.

The Sport Artist of the Year is presented annually to an individual who captures the spirit and life of sport so that future generations can relive the drama of today's competition.

Influential Artist Wyland to Paint Mural at the Academy

One of the most influential artists of the 21st Century, Wyland, will paint a marine life mural at the Academy on Sunday 7 October. Sea life mural paintings that address environmental issues are a Wyland trademark. The mural will involve the help of children from the Mobile Bay area.

Through the power and grace of cavorting dolphins, Wyland's image, "Faster, Higher, Stronger" (pictured right), mirrors the Olympic motto, "Swifter, Higher, Stronger."

Wyland has been chosen as an official Olympic artist for the United States Olympic team competing in the 2008 Beijing Games. This is the first time the U.S. Olympic Committee has endorsed an artist committed to conservation.

Wyland has been hailed as a "Marine Michelangelo" by *USA Today*. His work has appeared in museums, corporate collections and private homes in more than one hundred countries.



As an official artist for the United States Olympic Team at the 2008 Games in Beijing, Wyland has chosen to represent the Olympic motto of "Faster, Higher, Stronger," using the spirited image of three dolphins surging through the sea.

The equally successful, non-profit Wyland Foundation, in partnership with the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, is actively engaged in teaching millions of students about the oceans, rivers, lakes, streams and wetlands.

The Wyland Foundation has supported numerous conservation programs since 1993, including Wyland's monumental "Whaling Wall" mural project — an epic

series of more than 91 life-size marine life murals that span 12 countries on four continents and is viewed by more than a billion people.

Wyland will paint his 100th mural in Beijing in conjunction with the 2008 Olympic Games. He is also working with Yuan Xikun to erect a sculpture of the three dolphins in China.

Listed in Who's Who in American Art,

the Guinness Book of World Records, and many other publications, Wyland has even hosted several series for television, including, Wyland's Ocean World on the Discovery Channel

His efforts have been recognized by the United Nations, the Sierra Club, the Underwater Academy of Arts and Sciences and public institutions throughout the world.

Rutgers Coach Greg Schiano Receives College Football Game of the Year Award

Rutgers University's win over the University of Louisville on 9 November was named the 2006 "College Football Game of the Year" by the Academy. Coach Greg Schiano accepted the award during a press conference in May at the Hale Center on the Rutgers campus.

Rutgers received General Scholarship Award of \$5,000 and a shadow box encasing a medallion, proclamation and Artist Proof #1 of the foremost college football artist Daniel A. Moore's "Resurgence." The painting depicts fullback Brian Leonard clearing the way for Ray Rice to set up the winning field goal, as Coach Schiano observes the action from the sideline. This masterful creation is a fitting tribute for the institution.

The inaugural College Football Game of the Year Award is part of the Academy's Awards of Sport, which pays "Tribute to the Artist and the

Athlete." Rutgers, which played in the first official college game against Princeton on 6 November 1869, trailed Louisville 25-7 in the first half before the Scarlet Knights stormed back to win on a dramatic field goal by Jeremy Ito in the closing seconds.

With this protocol, Worldteam enters the arena of sport education with the Academy. As part of the agreement, the Academy will deliver certification programs in sport marketing and basketball coaching in China.

Dr. Thomas P. Rosandich, Academy President and CEO, recently met with Worldteam President Jack Guo in Beijing to sign the agreement that will integrate the international resources of the Academy and Worldteam to promote the development of sport education, academic research and sport services in China.

Guo, a former marketing leader for Red Bull Energy Drink, developed Worldteam from a three-on-three street basketball league. Compared to the old Amateur Athletic Union (AAU), Worldteam has become the largest organized amateur basketball league in China. It features 150,000 players competing on 10,000 teams which play more than 100,000 games in 188 cities each year.

From its beginning, Worldteam has expanded its capabilities to deliver goods and services to over 800,000 members.

Ron Dickerson Appointed to the Academy's Board of Trustees


The Academy announced that Ron Dickerson, Special Advisor to the President


Dickerson worked at the Academy from 2000-2004 as the Chair of Sports Coaching. His long and distinguished career includes tenures as head foot-

Byron Cunningham begins his first season as the head athletic trainer for football at the University of Illinois after serving as the team's main assistant since 2005.



Cunningham arrived at Illinois with extensive experience at the clinic, collegiate and professional level. He spent the 2003 season with the Chicago Bears and then served as an assistant athletic

trainer in NFL Europe for the 2004 season. Cunningham also worked as the head athletic trainer for Bishop McNamara High School in Kankakee, Ill.

Cunningham began his career with a pair of internships with the Indianapolis Colts and Auburn University in 2002-03. At Auburn, he was responsible for injury treatment and rehab.

The Mobile, Ala. native graduated from Florida A&M with a bachelor's degree in physical therapy in 1998. He earned his Master of Sports Science degree in sports medicine from the Academy in 2002. Cunningham is certified as a physical therapist as well as an athletic trainer. He is a member of the American Physical Therapy Association.

Matthew Riley, President of the Bakersfield Condors, was named ECHL Executive of the Year. Riley is responsible for the growth and development of Bakersfield Sports Entertainment, which for a second consecutive season drew over 200,000 fans and made donations to the community in excess of \$470,000.

He currently serves on the ECHL Board of Directors and Executive Committee and is the ECHL Vice-Chairman.

The Keokuk, Iowa native has previously served as the Executive Director of the Mobile BayBears and was integral in the construction of Hank Aaron Stadium. Riley earned his Master of Sports Science degree in Sport Management from the Academy in 1990.

William "Tim" Orr will serve his third season as a Defensive Line Coach for Florida A&M University. Orr began his coaching career at Bethel High School in Hampton, Va., as the defensive line coach.

Jerry Richardson is the majority owner and founder of the Carolina Panthers of the National Football League. Richardson is a graduate of Wofford College (NC), for which he played wide receiver, setting several school records. He was taken in the thirteenth round of the 1959 NFL Draft by the Baltimore Colts. His most notable reception was in the 1959 NFL championship win against the New York Giants, in which he caught the winning touchdown pass from Johnny Unitas. Using his \$3,500 check from the playoff games, Richardson founded Spartan Foods, a food-service

company that manages Hardee's, Quincy's Steakhouse and Denny's franchises in the

ACADEMY HONORS COLLEGE ATHLETIC LEADERS

Billy Donovan, head coach of the 2006 and 2007 National Champion University of Florida men's basketball team, was honored with the Academy's Amos Alonzo Stagg Coaching Award. Donovan concluded his 11th season as coach at the University of Florida atop a place he'd always dreamed of - on the ladder at the Georgia Dome cutting down the nets in his second straight national title game. He has led the Gators to two National Championships, three appearances in the NCAA title game and three straight SEC Tournament titles.

Brenda Frese, head coach of the 2006 National Champion University of Maryland women's basketball team, was honored with the Academy's C. Vivian Stringer Coaching Award. Frese, who grew up in Iowa idolizing former Hawkeye Coach C. Vivian Stringer, is the fifth-youngest coach (36) ever to win a national title in NCAA history.

Tom Jernstedt, a man known for his service to the sport of basketball and to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), received the Academy's Distinguished Service Award. Jernstedt joined the NCAA in 1972 as Director of Events and led the growth of the NCAA Final Four, making it one of the top events in sports. He is currently the executive vice president of the NCAA.

Southeastern Conference Commissioner Mike Slive received the Academy's Distinguished Service Award in May; in July he was appointed chair of the Division I Men's Basketball Committee for the 2008-09 academic year. Slive is the current coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series.

began lobbying to bring an NFL team to his home state in 1988. In 1993, NFL owners unanimously selected Charlotte as the next site. Richardson became the first player to own a team since George Halas of the Chicago Bears. After the inaugural 1996 season, he pledged that the Panthers would reach the Super Bowl within 10 years. That pledge was honored when the Panthers reached the Super Bowl in 2003.

DR. ERNST JOKL SPORTS MEDICINE AWARD

Since 1993, David R. Schmidt, M.D., has been the team physician and a pivotal player in the success of not only the San Antonio Spurs but of countless other athletes. Year round, Dr. Schmidt and his colleagues at Sports Medicine Associates of San Antonio tend to injured athletes at high school football games throughout South Texas and college football games at Trinity University as well as Rampage hockey, Silver Stars women's basketball and Missions baseball games. This year, Dr. Schmidt opened the Texas Center for Athletes, a 133,000-square-foot, four-story building that houses a community practice featuring research facilities and a surgery suite, as well as nutrition, rehab and psychology services.

Dr. Schmidt serves on numerous committees and medical societies, including the U.S. Olympic Sports Medicine Society and the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine.

PATRICK WHITE HONORED WITH ALABAMA ATHLETE OF THE YEAR AWARD



West Virginia University quarterback Patrick White, a former star at Daphne High School, received the Alabama Athlete of the Year award in front of a packed atrium at the Academy in May. "What an award," enthused White. "I want to thank all of the voters and all of the people who showed up today to support me."

White was named the Academy Alabama Athlete of the Year for 2006 after an online vote presented by al.com.

The Alabama Athlete of the Year award is given to an athlete beyond the high school level who was either born in, is currently playing in or has previously participated in sports at any level within the state.

Last season, White was named Big East Conference Offensive Player of the Year after finishing the season with 1,074 yards rushing (25th in NCAA history among quarterbacks) and 1,524 yards passing. He holds the Big East record for career rushing yards for a quarterback. He is the ninth quarterback ever to rush and pass for more than 200 yards in a game. White led West Virginia to a win in the Gator Bowl over Georgia Tech. He was 9-of-15 for 131 yards and two touchdowns and rushed 22 times for 145 yards and a score.

To win the honor of Alabama Athlete of the Year, White beat out Seattle Seahawks running back and former Crimson Tide player Shaun Alexander and Louisiana State University quarterback JaMarcus Russell.

Past winners include Vonetta Flowers. Cornelius Bennett, Shaun Alexander, Charles Barkley, Davey Allison and Tim Hudson.

Online Degree Programs Available Anywhere in the World



The Academy has been approved to participate in the Air University (AU) Associate-to-Baccalaureate Cooperative (ABC) program, which will allow United States Air Force airmen to turn an associate's degree from the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) into a bachelor's degree from the Academy.

The Academy has bachelor's degree completion articulation agreements with over 25 junior and community colleges including Pensacola Junior College, City College of San Francisco and Columbus State Community College in Ohio.

Articulation agreements allow students the opportunity to complete general education class work at junior or community colleges and then enroll at the Academy with the guarantee that their two-year college general education courses will be credited toward a bachelor's degree.

"As a former Marine, the U.S. military is very special to me," said Academy President and CEO Dr. Thomas P. Rosandich. "The Academy's bachelor's degree programs are a great avenue for military personnel to enter the sports industry."

Military Financial Aid

The Academy is approved by the United States Department of Defense to offer degree courses to members of the Armed Forces, including members of the Army National Guard.

distance learning and bachelor's degree opportunities for Airmen, and the AU-ABC program aligns with this Air Force vision," said Bettie Varnado, CCAF chief of media and distance learning. "It also meets AU's near-term goal of providing enhanced educational opportunities for our enlisted force."

The Air Force Portal acts as the gateway to the AU-ABC program, which allows students to do everything online.


"Once in the portal students can then open a program and view a degree plan that shows the required credits for the program, the CCAF credit transfer and the remaining credits needed to complete their degree," added Varnado. "Those utilizing AU-ABC can do all academic

administrative functions online, to include virtual counseling and applying for tuition assistance."

The Academy's Bachelor of Sports Science (B.S.S.) degrees in sports coaching, sports management and sports studies are available entirely online. Courses can be taken at any time and from any place in the world. The Academy has a web page dedicated to military financial aid at http://www.ussa.edu/military finaid.asp. Academy admissions counselors are trained on the latest military financial aid offerings.

To participate in the AU-ABC program, registrants must be on active duty in the Air Force, Air Force Reserve or Air National Guard. However, degree requirements can be completed after a member retires or separates from the service.

As part of this partnership, the Academy will automatically accept credits earned by airmen with a CCAF degree and apply them to a bachelor's degree. There are currently 60,000 CCAF graduates in the Air Force qualified to apply for the AU-ABC.





Bachelor of Sports Science (B.S.S.)

The Academy offers one-of-a-kind bachelor's degree completion programs in sports coaching, sports management and sports studies. The Academy will accept students with 49 to 90 transferable college semester hours.

Master of Sports Science (M.S.S.)

The 33-semester hour master's degree can be completed online in **one year** and offers majors in sports coaching, sports fitness, sports management, sports medicine and sports studies. For those who wish to study on campus, the Academy offers a summer residential program that can be completed in one year.

Doctor of Education (Ed.D.)

The 60-semester hour doctoral degree is available **online** and is one of only three nationally approved (SMPRC) sports management doctoral programs. The "Three Summers Plus" program allows students the option of completing the Ed.D. degree in **three years** through a combination of online and summer resident study. Students can take an emphasis in sports medicine or Olympism.

Continuing Education

The Academy's Continuing Education programs serve many sport associations, such as the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), the National Strength and Continuing Association, and U.S. Track and Field.
