H.E. Sam Kahamba Kutesa, President of the United Nations General Assembly, Honored by the Academy

His Excellency Sam Kahamba Kutesa was awarded a 2015 Distinguished Service Award (DSA) by the Academy in recognition of his contributions to sport throughout the world.

Kutesa was elected President of the United Nations (UN) General Assembly's sixty-ninth session in June 2014. At the time of his election, he had been serving as Uganda's Minister for Foreign Affairs since 2005, a post he still holds today.

A lawyer, parliamentarian, and businessman, Kutesa has a wide range of experience in interna-

tional affairs. During his tenure as Foreign Minister, Uganda has hosted high-level meetings of key intergovernmental bodies such as the Commonwealth Heads of Government Summit in 2007, the Council of Ministers of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) in 2008, and the African Union (AU) Heads of State Summit in 2010

Kutesa's contributions to the world of sport come from the UN's program of "Sustainable Development Goals" (SDGs), which he spearheaded. The SDGs were an outcome of the Rio+20

Conference and focus on goals which will assist all relevant stakeholders in developing comprehensive programs for their advancement. Sport and sport-related activities are a fundamental element of the SDGs.

In its statement of purpose, the members declared that they wanted to establish an "inclusive and transparent intergovernmental process open to all stakeholders, with a view to developing global sustainable development goals to be agreed by the General Assembly," and sport plays a vital role in that process.

"We are pleased to honor Kutesa with our Distinguished Service Award due to his outstanding work with the Sustainable Developmental Goals using sport as a fundamental vehicle in attaining them," said Dr. Thomas P. Rosandich, President and CEO of the Academy.

The DSA is part of the Academy's Awards of Sport program and is given annually to individuals who have made outstanding contributions to national or international sports through instruction, research, or service.

Instruction means that

the individual must have been engaged in the act or process of imparting or acquiring knowledge in the area of sports on two continents.

Research means that the individual must have been engaged in the organized and systematic inquiry of investigation into sports to discover or revise facts, theories, or publications in the discipline spanning two or more continents.

Service means that the individual must have been engaged in the organized and systematic supply of sports required by the public on two or more continents for more than 20 years.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

A Special Graduation Ceremony In Conjunction With The Awards of Sport

We had the privilege of honoring three outstanding individuals during a Graduation Ceremony held in conjunction with the Academy's Awards of Sport Ceremony on Thursday, 5 November 2015.

Professor Franco Ascani, 2015 International Honorary Doctorate Recipient

First, we honored Professor Franco Ascani, who has been the President of the Federation Internationale Cinema Television Sportifs (FICTS) since 1996, promoting the values and cultural functions of the sport movement worldwide through television and motion pictures.

In addition to his experience with FICTS, Ascani is also an active member of the International Olympic Committee's Culture and Olympic Heritage Commission, on which I served with him for many years. He is the former President of the Union Eupéenne du Sports pour Tous and the former Vice President of the Fédération Internationale du Sport pour Tous. He has also served as the Director of the Master's degree "Sport Management Marketing and Society" at Università degli Studi Milano-Bicocca since 2002.

Also a journalist, Ascani has authored several books about sports management and more than 200 publications on scientific reviews. He is an internationally recognized

authority on sports communication, who has lectured at the master's and undergraduate levels in sports law, sports management, sports marketing, and the sociology of sport. No stranger to being honored for his dedication to the sport movement, Ascani has been presented with over 30 awards, including the International Olympic Committee Award in 2004.

David Wallechinsky, 2015 National Honorary Doctorate Recipient

Secondly, we honored David Wallechinsky, who is an encyclopedia of facts, figures, and general knowledge. He is a man of intelligence, insight, and opinion, who possesses the literary skills to express all of them in a readable manner. Perhaps what defines Wallechinsky best, though, is that he cares about people, politics, and Olympic sport.

As President of the International Society of Olympic Historians (ISOH) since 2012 and a member of the organization since its inception in 1991, Wallechinsky has spearheaded the effort to promote and

study the Olympic Movement and Olympic Games. Here, again, I had the privilege of serving on the ISOH. For more than three decades now, he has kept readers abreast of the Olympics by updating his reference volumes *The Complete Book of the Summer Olympics* and *The Complete Book of the Winter Olympics*, which are considered to be the single most important history of the Olympic Games.

All in all, Wallechinsky has authored more than a dozen books. Two of those books – *What Really Happened to the Class of '65?* and *The Book of Lists* – were turned into television series by NBC and CBS. He also has been

a guest on "Eye to Eye" with Katie Couric, "The O'Reilly Factor," ABC World News, and CNN's "The Situation Room." In addition, he received an Honorary Doctorate from the National University of Physical Education and Sport of Ukraine, and has been inducted into the Trivia Hall of Fame.

Commander David Peterson, Ed.D., 2015 Alumnus of the Year

Last but not least, Commander David Peterson received our 2015 Alumnus of the Year Award. Commander Peterson exemplifies everything for which the Academy stands, as he serves as the Executive Officer of the Physical Education Department at the U.S. Naval Academy and as the Director of their Human Performance Laboratory (*see page 7*).


Accomplished Painter and Sculptor Joseph Sheppard Named Academy's 2015 Sport Artist of the Year

Selected by the Academy's Art Committee, Joseph Sheppard was recognized as the 2015 Sport Artist of the Year during the 31st Annual Awards of Sport program held on Thursday, 5 November 2015, on the Academy's campus in Daphne, Ala.

Sheppard, born in Owing Mills, Md., in 1930, is an award-winning artist, painter, and sculptor. He first became interested in depicting sports, especially boxing, after he completed a cover for Sports Illustrated. He has spent more than six decades documenting life through realist paintings, drawings, and sculptures building an enviable reputation in the art world.

He has been awarded numerous honors, including the Gold Medal of Honor in 1994 from the National Sculpture Society in N.Y. and more recently, the XVIII Premio Internazionale Pietrasanta e la Versilia nel Mondo in Italy.

In addition, his work can be found in the collections of such prestigious institutions as the Baltimore Museum of Art, the Carnegie Museum of Art in Pittsburgh, the Columbus Museum of Fine Arts in Ohio, the National Art

Museum of Sports in Ind., and the National Portrait Gallery in Washington D.C.

Sheppard not only paints and sculpts, he has also written several books on art. His book *How to Paint Like the Old Master* is one of his most popular. Each chapter is devoted to a different Old Master – Dürer, Titian, Veronese, Caravaggio, Vermeer, Hals, Rubens, and Rembrandt – and is divided into two sections that simplify the processes taken by the "Old Masters."

Painting Commemorating the 2014 College Football Game of the Year Unveiled

Just as balloting began for the 2015 College Football Game of the Year (CFGOY), the Academy's 2005 Sport Artist of the Year, Daniel Moore, unveiled the official 2014 CFGOY painting, "Champions of a New Era," depicting Ohio State's 42-20 victory over Oregon in the inaugural College Football Playoff National Championship Game.

Coming into the playoffs as the Number 4 seed, Ohio State took charge of its own destiny with a solid 42-35 win over the Number 1 seed, Alabama, in the Sugar Bowl, which served as a semi-final game. From there, the Buckeyes went on to

dominate the Number 2 seed, Oregon, in the championship game.

This award is part of the Academy's Awards of Sport series. Nominations are submitted weekly by the CFGOY Committee, which consists of eminent sport leaders. The committee is comprised of former athletic directors and coaches along with individuals active in collegiate football, who meet specific criteria to serve on the committee and exhibit no bias in their vote.

Museum Open House Celebrating Olympic Day Featured Sport Art from Around the World

The faculty and staff of the Academy celebrated Olympic Day on Tuesday, 23 June 2015. Olympic Day is a worldwide annual celebration in recognition of the Modern Olympic Games. The Academy offered an open house featuring the institution's diverse, one-of-a-kind Olympic art collection, and a reception which included former 1996 USA Team Handball Olympian, Darrick Heath.

During the open house, the public was invited to view Olympic art in the Gallery, Library, and outdoor Sport Sculpture Park, which features many pieces created by Bruce Larsen, a sculptor from

Fairhope, Ala. Many of these found-object sculptures are named for great gold medalist Olympians, including sprinter Valeriy Borzov, gymnast Nastia Liukin, and basketball great Michael Jordan

Around the world, more than 160 countries take

part in the annual celebration. Olympic Day, created in 1948 to commemorate the birth of the Modern Olympic Games, focuses on Olympic values and ideals, such as fair play, perseverance, respect, and sportsmanship.

In the U.S., Olympic Day events range from small gatherings to large, citywide events, but very few, if any, feature Olympic art collections like that housed at the Academy.

Detroit Red Wings Legend Gordie Howe Presented with Prestigious Eagle Award

Legendary Detroit Red Wings Hockey Hall of Fame Inductee, Gordie Howe, was presented with the Academy's 2015 Eagle Award by his son, Murray Howe, M.D., the Chairman of Toledo Hospital's Department of Radiology in Ohio. Howe was recognized for his many accomplishments as a hockey player and for his great contributions to sport in general throughout the world.

With a career spanning more than 50 years, Howe is considered to be one of the greatest hockey players in the world. In 1997, "Mr. Hockey" was signed to a one-game contract with the Detroit Vipers of the International Hockey League (IHL) and the 70-year-old superstar strapped on his skates to play one last time. This final performance made Howe the only hockey player to have spent five decades on the ice at the professional level, playing for the National Hockey League (NHL), World Hockey League (WHL), and IHL from the 1940s to the 1990s.

Seattle Seahawks Quarterback Russell Wilson Honored with Thorpe All-Around Athlete Award

Russell Wilson, the great Quarterback for the Seattle Seahawks, was presented with the 2015 Jim Thorpe All-Around Athlete Award by College Football Game of the Year Committee member and former University of Washington Athletic Director, Mike Lude, at the Virginia Mason Athletic Center in September 2015.

A gifted athlete, Wilson can play his position so many different ways that it boggles the mind. He can be the standard drop-back quarterback, the scrambler, the run-first guy, the thinking man's signal-caller, the game manager, and the game changer. Anything you want, he possesses in his bag of tricks with room to spare.

Aside from his multidimensional skills on full display each Sunday in the fall, Wilson was also drafted out of high school by the Baltimore Orioles in the 41st round of the 2007 Major League Baseball Draft. Instead of playing full time for the Orioles, Wilson opted to follow through on a scholarship offer to N.C. State. After quarterbacking the Wolfpack football in the fall, he managed to play shortstop on the baseball team in the



spring. Following his junior season, he was drafted in the fourth round by the Colorado Rockies and played for their A-level affiliates in 2010 and 2011.

USA Today's Nancy Armour Recognized with Reagan Award

Based in Chicago, III., Armour covers major events such as the Olympics, the World Cup, and the Masters. In addition to her long-term, in-depth pieces, she produces columns to provide analysis of big games and events of national interest.

During the 2015 NCAA Division I men's basketball tournament, she opined in an article that the blueprint for beating undefeated Kentucky had been unearthed by Cincinnati, even in a 13-point loss for the latter. Panned by some for such commentary, she proved to be right as Notre Dame pushed the Wildcats in the same fashion later in the tourney before Wisconsin followed suit and ultimately beat them.

Perhaps the most telling part of her true value in the media today is that what she produces gets people to think, react, and respond. Her "voice" is a strong one, and continues to show it has a place in the world of sports.

Juan Antonio Samaranch Award Goes to Mcfadden

Tatyana McFadden was presented with the 2015 Juan Antonio Samaranch IOC President's Disabled Athlete Award by Academy Trustee Joseph Szlavik in recognition of her strength and determination.

McFadden's path was not an easy one and began in a Russian orphanage, where she spent the first six years of her life without so much as a wheelchair. She managed to keep up with the other children by learning to walk on

her hands, a task that has served her well in the athletic realm due to the strength she developed in her arms.

Competing for the U.S., she has won 10 medals in Summer Games dating back to 2004. McFadden holds 15 World Championship titles and is currently looking to defend her Grand Slam World Marathon title for a second consecutive year by winning all four marathons in Boston, Chicago, London, and New York City.

Former University of Texas Basketball Coach Jody Conradt Honored At Home Opener

Jody Conradt, the former Women's Basketball Coach at the University of Texas at Austin, was presented with a 2015 Distinguished Service Award at the University of Texas versus Oklahoma State football game by Academy Trustee Don C. Wukasch, M.D., for her continued involvement with sports and trying to help others.

Conradt developed a passion for basket-ball, first as a player and then as a coach. In high school, she averaged 40 points per game. At Baylor University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1963, she averaged 20 points per game. Conradt really scored, though, once she took up coaching.

The Longhorns remained a national pro-

gram the remainder of Conradt's coaching career, even making the Final Four in 2003, not to mention Sweet 16s the year before and after that. All told, she won exactly 900 games as a women's basketball coach, was the first women's basketball coach to reach the 700-win plateau, was the second woman ever inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, and was named the National Coach of the Year four times.

In a truly amazing testament to Conradt's teaching skills, take note that she also coached volleyball at UT-Arlington and Texas a combined five years, posting a 165-76-15 record in the process. She also served as Women's Athletics Director at Texas from 1992 through 2001. ■

Esteemed Table Tennis Player Dr. Michael Scott Recognized by Academy

Dr. Michael Scott skillfully worked both sport and medicine into his vocational pursuits, and for doing so he was presented with a 2015 Distinguished Service Award (DSA) by Academy College Football Game of the Year Committee member and former Athletic Director at the University of Washington, Mike Lude.

Born in Butte, Mont., to a father who was a surgeon and a mother who was a nurse, there was little doubt what career path Dr. Scott would take. Seattle became home, where he attended high school and college before going off to medical school in Nebraska and then interning in

dermatology practice
in Seattle following
stints as a captain
in the U.S. Army
Medical Corps in
World War II and
as an Army dermatology consultant
stationed in Munich,
Germany.

He played tennis for some time before switching from racket to paddle and taking up table tennis.

Ultimately, he'd be named to the USA Table Tennis Hall of Fame.

His reach extended well beyond table tennis, as Dr. Scott also availed his drug-testing services to the Pan-Am Games, Olympic Games, and World Championships.

Dr. Wlodzimierz Starosta Presented with Distinguished Service Award for His Lifelong Work in Sport Kinetics

Dr. Wlodzimierz Starosta was presented with a 2015 Distinguished Service Award in conjunction with the "13th International Scientific Conference of Sport Kinetics – Sport and Exercise for Health and Quality of Life," in Warsaw-Biala Podlaska, Poland.

The award was presented to Dr. Starosta by the Vice President of Józef Piłsudski University of Physical Education in Warsaw, Dr. Jerzy Sadowski, and the General Secretary of International Association of Sport Kinetics, Dr. Jan Konarski. He is the first President of the International Association of Sport Kinetics, a scientific organization started in 1990 designed to create appropriate conditions for the advancement of human development and sport kinetics. The intent, through the sharing of information, is to gain a better understanding of human movement and physical fitness, and to promote each.

A prodigious writer, Dr. Starosta currently is working on his 69th book and has had more than 600 papers pub-

lished in 29 countries as he has strived to share what he knows in both medical and practical terms.




Student responses from the August 2015 exit interviews after graduation.

In this role, he acts as the Senior Military Advisor and Reporting Senior Officer for all active duty military personnel within the department. The Naval Academy's Physical Education Department is one of the broadest of its kind in the nation and is responsible for the physical mission development for each Midshipmen within the brigade. This is accomplished through structured and rigorous instruction in the areas of swimming, personal defense, recreational sports, and administration of the semi-annual Physical Readiness Test.

Commander Peterson also serves as the Director of the Human Performance Laboratory at the Naval Academy. In this role, he provides physiological testing and fitness counseling to various Division I varsity and club sport athletes, as well as general Midshipmen struggling to meet physical mission requirements.

International Outreach: An Academy Cornerstone

The Academy has long been known for the reach and breadth of its international programs spanning more than 66 nations over the past 40 years. The services offered to sport organizations and educational institutions of all types by the Academy have varied in scope from the full-charge conduct of national sport programs to clinics, seminars, and symposia. Highlights of the Academy's educational activities abroad are many and varied, and this year include:

Malaysia

Among the nations with which the Academy has had a long history stretching back to the early 1980s is Malaysia. The Academy's work in that nation has continued this year with the teaching of the International Diploma in Physical Education and Sport Coaching (IDPESC) program for the third year in a row to more than 970 Malaysian school teachers at seven sites around the country. While the 10 modules of classroom instruction were delivered from October through December 2014, by 23 members of the Academy's faculty, the experiential "mentorship" portion of the program was completed during the course of this year and more than 880 of these students will be awarded their certificates at a convocation that will take place in Kuala Lumpur on Friday, 4 December 2015.

A new program in Malaysia that launched in October 2015, is a special pilot project for the Malaysian National Service Training Department. The Academy has four members of its National Faculty on the ground for a three-month

assignment near Kuala Lumpur teaching in a special "train the trainers" program in the areas of physical fitness, sport, and recreation. This is a new program in Malaysia and eventually the requirement for National Service shall reach most Malaysian youth following the completion of their post-secondary school studies.

Peoples Republic of China

Dr. Christopher Rampacek, a longtime National Faculty member from Houston, Texas, who has taken on assignments for the Academy

> in Malaysia and Thailand, traveled to the Sports Institute of Henan University in Kaifeng this past March. There he taught a three-course certificate program in sports coaching for the Academy to university students on Athlete Development, Physical Fitness, and Sports Administration for Coaches. He also delivered a special

course on Coaching Methodology to the faculty from the Sports Institute.

In September, and for the second year running, the Academy kicked off its International Sport Diploma (ISD) program for the Shanghai Administration of Sports to 50 students working for various clubs and sport organizations in the Shanghai area. This eight-course program includes a mentorship and has been taught variously by the Academy's residential faculty and members of the National Faculty onsite at the Shanghai Sports Institute.

Those students who successfully completed the coursework are currently engaged under the guidance of carefully selected and wellestablished coaches in the region in the mentor-

ship portion of the program in their respective areas of specialization. It is anticipated that the ISD program will be continued in 2016, as discussions are currently under way to finalize the details.

Singapore

Two time Singapore Olympic swimmer, Mark Chay, the CEO of the International Sports Academy-Singapore (ISA(S)), visited the Academy in February 2015, to renew the agreement between the respective organizations for another five-year term. This agreement continues a relationship that began with the ISA(S) in 2003; although, the Academy has been working in the island nation since the early 1980s. The Academy's offerings there include a new wrinkle, insofar as the education authorities in Singapore have approved online and distance education for Singaporean students. Accordingly, ISA(S) will help to publicize and market the Academy's graduate degree programs in Singapore in additional to the ISD programs currently being delivered there.

Thailand

Thailand is another Southeast Asian nation with which the Academy has had a long relationship that dates to the mid-1980s. During a visit to Bangkok in May 2015, Academy Vice President and COO, Dr. T.J. Rosandich, renewed a long-standing Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Sports Authority of Thailand (SAT), the central sport authority for that nation, for another five-year term through 2020.

For the tenth year in a row, the Academy conducted its International Certification in Sports Coaching (ICSC) and Sports Management (ICSM) programs in Bangkok over the summer months. Approximately

50 students drawn from the SAT and its

affiliated sport organizations around the country attended each of these six-module certification courses conducted over three months. Following the conclusion of the classroom portion of the program, the SAT annu-

ally selects the best students from each program for a special study tour of sport in America. For the ninth year in a row, a delegation of 17 students and administrators from the SAT undertook a tour of various sports organizations and venues spanning 15 days from coast to coast in the United States.

The schedule for these programs for

2016 have already been set with the ICSC and ICSM courses to run from February through July and the tenth sports study tour to take place in

September.

United Arab
Emirates (UAE)

The Academy has added a sports dimension to the education and training services offered by Edrak Training and Consultancy, an enterprise in the UAE. While the Academy has

worked with Edrak since 2010, here, too, the Academy has a long history stretching back to the early 1980s. The Academy's cooperative agreement with Edrak was extended for another five years by Dr. T.J. Rosandich during a visit to

Dubai in May 2015.

Also in May, a contract was signed with the UAE Football Association for the development of the UAE Football Academy, through which a Football Club Operators Licensing scheme in four disciplines will be offered including Sports Administration, Sports Marketing, Media Relations, and Facilities and Events Management. The

grand opening for the Football Academy and the first courses will be offered in November 2015.

In Abu Dhabi this past September, Academy Doctoral Teaching Assistant (TA) Sandra Geringer was afforded the opportunity to present at the first Physical Education Teachers Forum organized by the Fatima Bint Mubarak Ladies Sports Academy. The Forum brought together physical education teachers from a variety of primary and secondary schools, both public and private, throughout the UAE. Geringer has played an active role in the Academy's international programs having also served as a faculty member in the 2014 Malaysian IDPESC program.

Academy Doctoral TAs are often afforded unique opportunities, such as international teaching assignments, that provide a broader view of the world of sport.


